Early in our ministry in Tacoma an international group of men and women started the International Reconciliation Movement. They went to different parts of the world where 'holocaust type' happenings had occurred in the past, between different people groups, and got the current leadership from each of the factions to come together and apologize for what had occurred. Incredible stories of relational healing, as well as healing of the land, occurred across the world, such as famines ending and crops being restored.

A Christian veterinarian who was part of that Reconciliation Movement heard about us and gave me a smooth red and white river rock that was from the Mashel River, near the Nisqually reservation just south of where we lived at that time. Over a hundred years earlier a massacre had occurred at the Mashel River when army volunteers slaughtered Native women, children and elderly men in the last battle of the Puget Sound Indian War. No one was ever punished or arrested for it. I kept that rock, that represented both red and white people, on the dashboard of my car for years as a reminder to pursue reconciliation with Native people.

Obviously, the need for reconciliation still exists, not just between Native and non-Natives, but in our marriage relationships, our churches and our communities. There is a solution: "I was wrong. Will you forgive me?" What that looks like in action is the challenge. Canada began the long, hard process by establishing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in 2007. In 2015 they held their closing event in Ottawa and presented their summary, including 94 'calls to action.' The US needs to start, but is scared to death of the possible financial consequences. We, as Native and non-Native believers of Jesus, should be the catalyst to make that happen. It begins with prayer and asking for Creator's wisdom and power to bring it about.
