

Conference Report — The prayers of many people for Tribal Ministry Conference 2023 bore much good fruit when about 90 participants (23 tribal identities represented) gathered on April 21 & 22 in Tacoma. The purpose of the conference was to gather Native Christian leaders, their people, and others who have a passion for Indigenous ministry, to unite in seeking God for a greater gospel impact among tribal communities in the Pacific Northwest. I believe this purpose was met.

Daron Butler (Navajo) gave a powerful challenge for us to pray for the Indigenous peoples of North America to



Those points of need are the cities of Seattle, Spokane and Portland, and four reservations within a short drive of Tacoma: Suquamish, Squaxin Island, Nisqually, and Chehalis. While there are certainly Indigenous believers in these places, we don't know of any functioning church, Bible study or other Native-focused Christian outreach in these seven locals! He is a missiological anthropologist, author, and founder of Global Development. As former dean of the E. Stanley Jones School of World Mission and Evangelism at Asbury Theological Seminary, Dr. Whiteman facilitated the enrollment and completion of doctoral studies of several First Nations/Native American leaders at the seminary.

attendees are overwhelmingly positive, and there is a strong desire to repeat the event next April. So the planning team has begun the process. While organizing an event of this nature is very time-consuming, the rewards are certainly worth it.
